Buxus spp

Common name:

Box hedge, Boxwood,

Palatability to Livestock:

Not known to be eaten.

Toxicity to Goats:

Low risk.

Toxicity to Other Species:

Potentially toxic to horses, sheep, cattle, pigs and camels, and humans, also domestic pets.

Poisonous Principle:

- . Unknown alkaloids.
- . Buxine and tannic acids.

Effects:

Signs and Symptoms;

- . Severe gastro-enteritis.
- . Diarrhoea.
- . Respiratory failure.

Health and Production Problems;

. Affected animals may die.

Treatment:

Be aware of potential health problems.

Integrated Control Strategy:

- . Garden plant.
- . Place clippings into disposable bags.
- . Do not feed these garden clippings to livestock.
- . The sap can cause irritation and itching.

Comments:

- . A genus of evergreen shrubs and trees, with square stems, grown for their foliage and habit.
- . It is slow growing and long lived; frost hardy, but requires sun, or only semi-shade, growing to 2-6metres high.

Leaves are small, oblong, opposite, glossy and dark green or variegated, smooth, thick and leathery. New growth is golden in the spring.

- . Leaves are toxic to animals and humans.
- . The flowers are insignificant, tiny and pale green, male and female together in leaf axils, appearing in springtime.
- . Fruit is an oblong capsule with black seeds.
- . Used as a dwarf edging plant for gardens, or as pot specimens. Vigorous roots, similar to privet.
- . These plants are often clipped into unusual shapes.
- . All parts are toxic, even the wood.
