Craspedia chrysantha

Common name: Golden billybuttons, Yellow drumsticks,

Palatability to Livestock:

Moderate at flowering.

Toxicity to Goats: Not known to be toxic,

Toxicity to Other Species: Sheep cattle and horses.

Poisonous Principle:

Cardiac glycocides, in dried plants.

Effects:

Signs and symptoms;

- . Staggering, stiffness,
- . Rapid breathing, twitching,
- . Diarrhoea,
- . Temporary blindness after 24 hours.

Health and Production Problems;

. Be aware of potential stock problems. . Avoid stock grazing this plant when it is mature.

Treatment; See Vet.

Integrated Control Strategy:

- . Controlled grazing.
- . Use herbicides.

Comments:

- . An erect, perennial, green-grey, woolly, herb, with a strong taproot, about 30cms high.
- . Several branched erect stems.
- . Leaves are grey-green and stem clasping, narrow, and woolly on the lower surface.

. Flower heads are globular and bright yellow, like yellow drumsticks, about 8mm in diameter, and about 25mm long. Many varieties, some are native to Australia.Occurs in all states except Tasmania, mainly

in inland areas.May cause temporary blindness in <u>horses</u>.In traveling cattle, deaths have occurred

overnight, with colic and diarrhoea.

. In <u>sheep</u>, deaths occur after mustering, especially after eating the mature plant.

. Do not stress livestock, as death can occur up to three weeks after removal from the plant. . The plant seems to be most toxic when mature and drying off.
