Eremophila longifolia

Common name: Emu bush, Berrigan, Native plum,

Palatability to Livestock: High at all stages.

Toxicity to Goats: Not known to be toxic.

Toxicity to Other Species: Livestock in general.

Poisonous Principle:

Unknown.

Effects:

- Signs and symptoms;
- . Dullness,
- . Reluctance to move,
- . Collapse.
- . Autopsy shows Haemmorhage in all tissues.

Health and Production Problems; If hungry or force fed, animals may get ill.

Treatment; .Be aware of potential stock problems.

Integrated Control Strategy:

. Control achieved by grazing management.

Comments:

. A widely distributed species, occurring on most soil types, growing up to three metres tall.

- . Withstands climatic extremes very well.
- . Disturbance of the roots promotes suckering.
- . Useful for preventing soil erosion.
- . Widely distributed in all states.
- . Drooping branches and foliage, leaves are very long and dull dark green.

. Flowers are pink to reddish, occurring most of the year. They are covered with tiny soft hairs, and curved and bell shaped, found in small groups, in the leaf axils.

- . Fruits are purplish black, and succulent.
- . A very good fodder plant, if care is taken with the intake.

. Used by Aborigines, externally for sores, and internally, as a cold cure.
