### **Common name:**

Bay tree,

## Palatability to Livestock:

Moderate.

## **Toxicity to Goats:**

Low risk.

# **Toxicity to Other Species:**

Horses.

# **Poisonous Principle:**

- . Cardiac glycocides in the leaves.
- . Laurostearine, lauric acid.

#### **Effects:**

Signs and symptoms;

- . Nervous symptoms,
- . Heart attack.

### Health and Production Problems;

. Death.

# Treatment;

- . Nil.
- . Be aware of potential stock problems.

# **Integrated Control Strategy:**

- . Do not feed these clippings to any livestock.
- . Weed or prune into disposable bags.

#### **Comments:**

- . A garden plant.
- . An attractive tree, growing to 20 metres.
- . Very slow growth.
- . Leaves are glossy green, oval, with pointed tips, and are used in cooking when dried.
- . Tiny flowers are a creamy white appearing in the leaf axils.
- . Berries only occur on the female trees.
- . All laurels are toxic, except *L. nobilis*, bay tree. These leaves are dried and cooked before being eaten.
